

I've seen a kiwi, what shall I do?

Please follow these steps if you see a kiwi anywhere

North Island brown kiwi are in a state of recovery. As their populations grow it will become more likely to see them. If you see a kiwi there are ways you can help:



If you see a kiwi, report it using this QR code.

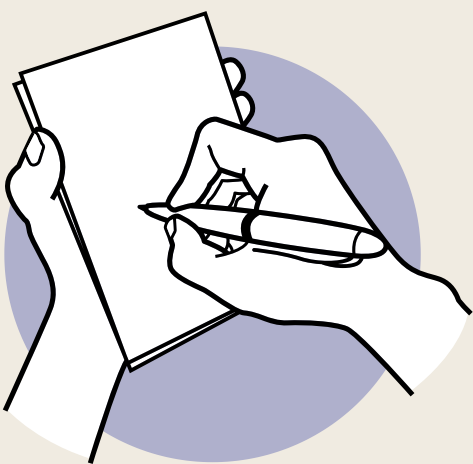
- When sharing your data, please include as much information as you can and include any supporting photos. Once you submit your observation, Save the Kiwi will review it then upload it to the map where you'll be able to see it too

Sick or injured kiwi?

- Seeing a kiwi out during the day doesn't necessarily mean it is sick or injured. It could just be feeding, especially during summer when the nights are short
- 0800 DOC HOT (0800 362 468) is the 24-hour emergency hotline for the Department of Conservation (DOC), which can be used for wildlife emergencies
- Contact Save the Kiwi or your local kiwi project for further advice on next steps



Dead kiwi



- Under the Wildlife Act 1953 protected wildlife (including kiwi) are the responsibility of DOC
- If you find a dead kiwi it needs to be reported to DOC, even if it looks like it's been dead for a while
- Contact your local DOC office and they will guide you through the steps
- Try not to disturb the kiwi or the area until you have spoken to DOC, as there could be key information about how the kiwi died. Taking photos and notes is helpful
- Any dead bird could carry disease, so it's important to practice good hygiene to keep yourself safe
